We are so blessed to have three unique and excellent performing ensembles which make up the entity we know as CGMC.

These three groups are truly dedicated to our mission and allow our singers and audience to have a wider range of musical opportunities and experiences. The largest group, of course, is the chorus, which currently has around 130 singers. We present three full concerts annually: a holiday show in December, a winter concert in March, and a Pride performance in June.


VOX is an auditioned ensemble with 18 members. They kick off our programming each year in October with a Halloween-themed show. They also have a featured number or two at each of the larger Chorus concerts. VOX is available to do a variety of

paid gigs throughout the year. The size of the group makes it easier to take on these one-of-a-kind performance opportunities.

Finally, we are delighted to have our new Assistant Artistic Director, Jordan Saul, who joined our professional staff last fall, and is the choral conductor for our special sacred music ensemble, Illuminati.

Referring to a Latin expression meaning "the enlightened," Illuminati was created to respond to the community's expressed desire for musical performances of a sacred or spiritual nature. Its' mission is to extend our outreach during the year, particularly to religious organizations, while respecting our members' individual spiritual beliefs.

Illuminati's annual year-end concert, featuring a full program of sacred and classical music, is coming up this month – on Sunday, May 19th, at 2pm, at the Worthington United Methodist Church, located at 600 High Street, in Worthington. Get your tickets today – at our cgmc.com website.



Illuminati also performs monthly at various religious institutions and events throughout central Ohio, and sometimes beyond, and is proud to be a bridge between the LGBTQIA+

and religious communities. Illuminati works to demonstrate that we all have a place in sacred spaces, and are whole, holy, and loved. Illuminati's mission is to demonstrate, through song, that ALL people have a place in the religious community.

Illuminati is a non-auditioned ensemble. Members of Illuminati are considered members of the Columbus Gay Men's Chorus, but participation in the full chorus is not required. Illuminati has the distinction of being one of the only LGBTQ+ sacred ensemble in the United States.

Illuminati performs during worship services in churches, synagogues and other places of worship once each month during the performing season September through June. Illuminati does not sing full concerts during these services, but rather sings several anthems as part of the normal worship service to complement the service. This year's "Songs of the Spirit" program will be presented by the singers of Illuminati on May 19, and will center around themes of courage. The text of 'Silence My Soul' was written by the Nobel Laureate Rabindranath Tagore. The piece reflects the courage required for stillness and meditation. We also have a work by G.F. Handel called 'Arm, Arm Ye Brave' from the oratorio "Judas Maccabaeus," which is a literal call to arms. Other works, like 'I Will Be a Child of Peace'

by Elaine Hagenberg and 'By Our Love' by Christy Nockels nod to the traditions of Illuminati, and the courage it takes for LGBTQIA+ people to inhabit religious spaces that have been historically unaccepting.

"Our relationship with religion has rarely been clean," said Saul, referring to the LGBTQ+ community. "For Illuminati to identify as it does (as both LGBTQ+ and sacred-based) has a defiance about it." And yet, "no bigotry owns the spiritual space," Saul said.

At this concert, we are so excited and truly honored to feature an internationally known composer, Craig Courtney for his anthem "There Will I Be." Courtney joined us in rehearsal this season to talk about his work and



his artistic process and will be there to accompany Illuminati from the piano at our concert.

MEET ILLUMINATI'S CONDUCTOR JORDAN SAUL CGMC'S Assistant Artistic Director

We asked Jordan Saul to share some personal thoughts about herself: First, I really love our city, and I explore Columbus whenever I have the chance. I enjoy attending all kinds of concerts (there are so many great venues in



CBUS!), museums (especially art museums and galleries), and of course chomping down pickle pizza on the patio at Slammers. If time allows, I might also be found curled up on my couch playing Tears of the

Kingdom. I have two rescue cats, Zero and Bones, who are both entirely enchanting. I love interacting with animals of all kinds and feel a special kinship with felines.

I have studied piano, percussion, and voice. I admire artists in the music world that have a vision and the skills to bring it to fruition. In the choral world, I admire Joe Miller (who is now the director of choral activities at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and was my graduate advisor at Westminster Choir College). In the pop world, I'm pretty obsessed with Chappell Roan and The Last Dinner Party recently.

The best part about working with CGMC is THE PEOPLE! As a queer and neurodivergent person on the podium, I often calculate how much of myself I can be in any given space. I never have to run this calculation with CGMC! I can be direct, silly, nervous, at ease, intense, loving in whatever combination I feel and I am wholly embraced by our community. It is such a gift.

This was my first season with Illuminati, and in addition to building relationships with our members, I have used this time to learn about the arc of music making that works well with this unique ensemble. I have started collecting scores for our 2024-25 season and am very excited about how our music is looking so far! We will continue exploring sacred music from cultures around the world, working with skilled instrumentalists, and rehearsing with aplomb.

Each week in Illuminati rehearsal I am reminded of the relationships that are central to the members. There are singers in the group that have known one another for 30+ years, and I feel a strong sense of responsibility to listen to their opinions, histories, and perspectives as we build future seasons and experiences. They are cultural survivors, and Illuminati brings a stalwart courage to the spaces they inhabit. I feel honored to be a part of this music and this community.

What was your motivation to join the group? With the membership in my church choir steadily dwindling, I yearned to sing with a large chorus with a full TTBB sound.



What type of music do you most enjoy singing? I love the grand masterworks of the three "B's"... Bach, Beethoven & Brahms. Not only are these works sacred, they also give me an energy and joy I do not feel otherwise.

What's the best part of being a member of Illuminati? What delights me is our Director, Professor Jordan Saul, who freely shares her expertise as an educator. I am learning music theory and how to practice with the voice as an instrument. Mr. Courtney recently conducted a Master Class with our group and will be the accompanist for his work in our concert! How exciting is that? Many of our numbers will feature various instrumental accompaniments, including piano, organ, brass and strings. Our encore will shake, rattle, and roll the house down!

What's your favorite memory from your time in CGMC? I love it when our Ohio Theatre rehearsal hall shakes with the power of 125+ voices raised in astounding harmony.

What other extra-curricular activities and hobbies (outside of CGMC) do you enjoy and/or participate in? I staged a Tenebrae service this last month called The Passion of The Christ with my acting ensemble, The Maple Grove Players.

In my retirement I am focusing on my (rapidly becoming an extinct art form) of hand sketched portraits.

What are your other artistic pursuits? I am currently building an upper terrace of a back yard flower bed.



Anything else about your life/career that you'd like to include? As PR Director for The Columbus Palace Theatre, one of my responsibilities was placing a bowl of M&Ms in the performer's dressing room with all the brown ones removed because back in the day, Elvis was afraid of the color brown – so



now it is a superstition (and a homage) to have the same.

Do you have any pets? My eleven year-old Cocker Spaniel Burt, a rescue, keeps me healthy with our multiple daily walks. He likes falling asleep to John Rutter's 'Requiem'.
